Spotted Draft History

Spotted drafts have been recorded as far back as the early 19th century in Britain.

In 1825, Volume 1 of the English Cart-Horse Society (now The Shire Horse Society) recorded a pinto foal, No. 770, named Everett's Horse. It is thought that he may be ancestor to the pinto Shires that were common in the Fen country at that time. Sir Walter Gilbey in his book "Horses, Breeding to Colour" (1912) wrote of a Mr. B.B. Colvin of Hertfordshire, who, in the mid 1800's, had a herd of pinto Shires on his farm.



Most Shire breeders of that time did not appreciate the so-called parti-coloured horses and so did not register them. Despite the pinto coloured horse being spurned by many breeders and equine authorities, HM Queen Elizabeth II chose pinto drafts as drum horses for some of her regiments. These horses not only look magnificent but they stand steadfast among the music, cheers, and action of pageantry, a testament to the reliable, unflappable temperament of the Spotted Draft.
